It has also helped to position the budding entrepreneurs to join the Trinidad and Tobago She Trades Hub spearheaded by the Ministry of Trade and Industry, reflecting a shared commitment to empowering and advancing women in business and entrepreneurship across Trinidad and Tobago.

The She Trades Hub, which is an initiative of the International Trade Centre (ITC), is an online platform of over 700 women involved in many different sectors, such as food and beverage, health and wellness, arts and crafts, fashion, jewellery, education services and beauty. The platform's main purpose is to increase the number of women-owned businesses trading internationally. It also provides the perfect opportunity for building important networks and mentorship.

Minister Gopee-Scoon praised the success of the Boss Lady Project and acknowledged the Honourable Shamfa Cudjoe-Lewis, Minister of Sport and Community Development, and her team for delivering the comprehensive Boss Lady programme.
