In keeping with our Vision 2030 goals the Ministry of Trade and Industry is in the process of completing a Trade Policy and Strategy and a National Export Strategy (NES) which will be finalized following the completion of the Trade Policy and Strategy.

Both documents will serve as a guide for Trinidad and Tobago's export development and trade related initiatives over the next few years.

I encourage you to familiarise yourself with these documents when they have been finalized so you can be fully aware of Trinidad and Tobago's strategic objectives regarding trade and export development.

As newly recognized International Trade Specialists, you all have a critical role to play in building our nation. Exporters can now employ your skills to help them navigate the global trading system. exporTT and the private sector community will now have a wider network of qualified experts to utilize in order to help facilitate trade.

Indeed, 2017 was still a challenging year for the Trinidad and Tobago economy. Our current situation is more encouraging as we look towards a brighter and more prosperous future. This Government remains a partner to all trade related entities and we are ready to do what is necessary to unlock new opportunities and markets, and remove unnecessary and unfair bureaucracy. I look forward to working with all of you as we look towards the shared goal of improved economic prosperity.
